

Community United To Protect Theodore Roosevelt Park calling script for government & elected officials

TOPIC 4: Traffic

CALLER:

Hello, my name is <u>Caller Name</u>, I live on <u>Caller's Street</u>, and I am a constituent of <u>Mayor DiBlasio/ Borough President Gale Brewer/ Council Member X.</u>

I'm calling with a comment about the American Museum of Natural History's proposed Gilder Center expansion into Theodore Roosevelt Park.

GOVERNMENT STAFFER:

Yes, what is your comment?

CALLER:

I'm concerned because the Upper West Side is a super-high density residential area, divided by two major Avenues, **truck-routes really**, which serve downtown. Columbus Avenue has been reduced to mostly a two-lane street because of bike lanes, existing parking spots, and double-parked trucks unloading. The traffic problem can only get worse, and the MTA is unable to properly handle this.

A large new entrance at W 79^{th} Street and Columbus will bring even more congestion to this avenue and neighboring streets. Often over 50 school buses line the streets of this neighborhood, some double-parked, many of them with idling engines keeping waiting drivers warm or cool, depending on the season.

Currently, it is often so badly clogged that even emergency vehicles cannot get through. I regularly observe fire engines and ambulances stuck in traffic, blaring away for several minutes, unable to move.

Does <u>Mayor DiBlasio/ Borough President Gale Brewer/ Council Member X</u> have a position on this project?

GOVERNMENT STAFFER:

The <u>Mayor/ Borough President/ Council Member</u> is still developing his/her thoughts.

OR

The <u>Mayor/ Borough President/ Council Member</u> has come out against the project. HE/SHE thinks the negative effects on the neighborhood are too high.

OR



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The <u>Mayor/ Borough President/ Council Member</u> is in favor of the project. <u>HE/SHE</u> thinks the congestion issue has been adequately addressed by the museum's traffic plan.

CALLER:

OPTION 1:

I strongly urge <u>Mayor/ Borough President/ Council Member</u> to vocally oppose this project. This is a very serious issue. We cannot accept life-threatening delays as a normal part of life. I cannot imagine a worse location for a new, high volume entrance especially when a large, but barely used entry already, already exists on W 77th Street.

I'd also like to add: the Sunday Greenmarket issue has been very cavalierly addressed in the Museum's DEIS. The farmers will have no place to park and unload. A greenmarket may seem a minor concern, but it is of great importance, a great public good, to the residents.

OR

OPTION 2:

I urge the <u>Mayor/Borough President/Council Member</u> to take another look at this issue and reconsider <u>HIS/HER</u> position. In no way has this been adequately addressed. The Museum would like us to believe that the problem can be easily mitigated with simple, inexpensive and expedient signal changes and a widened crosswalk.

If this were true, why hasn't the MTA done these things already? Wider crosswalks and re-timed signals can't deal with the traffic we already have, let alone with congestion problems during the years of construction and afterward. This is a very serious issue. We cannot accept life-threatening delays as a normal part of life.
